Descriptions of the Workshops

Rick Kempa

1. The Ins and Outs of Publishing

This workshop provides participants with tools and techniques for pursuing publication of their work. Topics covered include how to conduct market research using online resources, prepare manuscripts for publication, write query letters and cover letters, establish a record-keeping system, and submit work for publication to journals and magazines (both online and print) and to book publishers.

2. The Enchantment of Short-Form Writing

This workshop will explore the short-form in fiction and non-fiction with varied practices that will generate provocative pieces of writing in as few as six words.

3. Organizing Your Thoughts: Research & Writing

Feeling overwhelmed by the details in your manuscript? Do important bits seem to get away from you? The index card system may be your friend. Tom's books are rich in detail and have complex story lines, yet they flow as smoothly as novels. In this workshop he will describe the index card system he devised to allow the orderly, reliable storage of a great deal of information that can subsequently be retrieved easily. Participants will apply the system to their own work so that they, too, can keep better track of the details and narrative of their work.

4. The Legacy of Orpheus

For as long as we've had language, poetry has ritualized our life. It has dramatized and informed us thru metaphor and figures of thought and feeling. Orpheus, more than any other, has epitomized the authority as well as the failings of poetry. Mr. Vlastos will examine the significance of Orpheus in modern verse from Rilke to Ritsos, from Gilbert to Strand to the recent work of Terrance Hayes.

11. Erotica: Kiss & Tell or A Red Herring Writing

For good reason, sexuality has been a major theme of some of the world's greatest poetry. Mr. Vlastos will examine historical and contemporary approaches to sexuality in poetry, discussing when and how desire answers to the idea of ends vs. means.

5. The Art of the Personal Essay

Do you have a story you'd like to share? Readers—and editors—love personal essays, and the process of writing them is satisfying, because you have the opportunity to reveal your perceptions about the world. In this session, we'll examine important elements of a personal essay, take a look at some examples, and try a few writing exercises. We'll also talk

about the publishing process. At the end of the session, you'll have the tools you need to put your stories on paper (or your laptop). All levels welcome.

10. Blogging 101: From Inspiration to Action

Have you been interested in starting a blog but don't know where to start? Blogging is a great way to share your ideas and expertise with the world (or perhaps simply with yourself and your family), and build an online presence. This workshop will guide you through each step of the way, from figuring out how to set up your blog to writing blog posts to marketing your writing. We'll also put pen to paper, so you leave with some tangible ways to go home and get started right away.
